On March 29 2015, the community along with Pastor Armstrong of Shiloh Baptist Church marched to the Cancer Screening Center at 416 Bellevue Ave for free Prostate Cancer Education and Screening.

African-American men are nearly 1.6 times more likely to be diagnosed with prostate cancer than Caucasian men and 2.4 times more likely to die from the disease.
